In 2005, Charlie played under the National Senior Games Association league and participated in Pittsburgh in the Senior Olympics. He's also played under the SSUSA, senior softball USA Organization that sanctions tournaments all over the country.

Charlie got emotional as he fondly remembered the 1999 Senior Olympics held in Orlando Florida at the Disney Wide World of Sports Campus. He marched in the Citrus Bowl with 250 other New Jersey athletes as they joined 12,000 others participants following the Olympic torch. Charlie has received a bronze medal in 2003 in Virginia, and three gold medals for competition in Louisville, Kentucky, California and Pittsburgh. Charlie wants to make more seniors aware of the fact that no matter at what age, you can still play softball. There are senior softball Leagues available in many local counties at all levels.
