
SAD YEAR OF NJSSA Long Time Veteran Players Pass Away



Besides managing these teams he was a member of the Board of Directors of the Tuesday Morning League, The Commissioner of the Saturday League and Saturday Fall League, and a member of the Board of Directors of the North Jersey Senior Softball Association. While he was a player/manager, he was constantly scouting for ball players to play on his teams. I know of other times when players were seriously ill in the hospital or were injured when playing. Sam/Sal was one of the first persons there to visit or even take them to the hospital. He always kept us informed of the condition of these fellow colleagues either by e-mail or announcements before the games. No matter what he did on the field, he was a very compassionate and caring individual and many ball players respected him for that.

On Tuesday, August 6, 2013 Sam/Sal was given the "Extra Base Hit Award" for his contributions to senior softball at the M.E.T.S.S League Annual BBQ. He was so emotionally overcome with this honor he hardly was able to speak. Little did we know at the time, his health was disintegrating at a faster pace than we had realized. Now, Sam/Sal is playing and managing in the BIG BALL PARK up THERE with other former colleagues, including Don Roth, Brian Leslie, Jay Horacek, John Healy, Mike Kane, and Don Slocum, to name a few. Now you have it!! The mystery is solved!! His formal name is Sam. Regardless how you remember him as either Sam or Sal, he was a true advocate for senior softball, an organizer of teams, and a caring individual. We are going to miss him.
